Tour of the Gold Commissioner's Camp

On Sunday April 23, CASSOC and Gold Camp Castlemaine hosted a combined event. It was a small pilot tour of the Government Camp bringing together expert historians and advocates for goldfields history. The purpose was to discuss ways in which the wider historian community can help in advocating for the Camp Reserve and the Gold Commissioner's Camp precinct that it sits within. We were fortunate to host experts from Bendigo and Ballarat as well as our leading local historian Dr Marjorie Theobald.

Doug and Martin are passionate about the extraordinary, world class, Mt Alexander goldfields geology. They are striving to reactivate FOMAD (Friends of Mt Alexander Diggings). CASSOC sees merit in their ideas which provide protection of heritage assets through sensitive adaptive reuse. Doug McCann sees potential tourism and economic advantages for the Shire, while fostering appreciation of its mining history and relics.

CASSOC meets Peter Cox, National Trust, Bendigo

In March, CASSOC had a productive meeting with Peter Cox, President of the National Trust Bendigo Branch. This active branch covers Castlemaine heritage assets. The branch also acts for Castlemaine National Trust members. Some may remember that Castlemaine used to have its own branch of the Trust.
