Recent events

UNESCO Victorian Goldfields World Heritage Bid

CASSOC received excellent feedback from our 11 November 2023 *UNESCO Victorian Goldfields World Heritage Bid* Information Night presented by Trevor Budge, OAM. Trevor and the Honourable John Brumby, co-convened the bid. An estimated one hundred people filled the Uniting Church Hall for a most informative presentation which highlighted the various styles of gold mining during the 19th century across many Victorian towns from Castlemaine to Beechworth.

There are high hopes that the bid will be successful and we await further developments.



On 4 November, Gold Camp Castlemaine held a Jewellery and Decorative Arts Auction at the Botanical Gardens Tearooms. This was another highly successful event for GCC, supported by CASSOC, with a number of committee and other CASSOC members volunteering at the event.



Council-related issues

* Heritage budget allocation

CASSOC has lodged a budget submission to Mount Alexander Shire Council, requesting an increased budget allocation to Heritage. We have also liaised with other community organisations, including historical societies in Mount Alexander Shire, encouraging them to also lodge their submissions in support. There is extensive planning work that is overdue and there are insufficient resources to complete any of this work. CASSOC will monitor this space.

Castlemaine, Campbells Creek and Chewton Housing and Neighbourhood Character Report

CASSOC has prepared and submitted to Council a response addressing concerns about disparities between the report and how it is interpreted in the *Guidelines* document. Our submission will soon be uploaded to our website.

Permit Application PA 141/2023 - Carwash facility

Permit Application PA 141/23 is for an extended hours carwash facility, petrol station and kiosk at the site of former Best Motors at 30-32 Duke St, Castlemaine. The proposed facility would be closed for only 5 hours at night, potentially exposing residents to unreasonable truck and traffic noise. Concerned community members are encouraged to lodge an objection to Council soon, as there is only a short window left to lodge. See the CASSOC website for more details about members' concerns:

Camp Reserve update (from MASC)



If you were wondering what was happening around two *Eucalyptus Camaldulensis* (River Red Gum) at Camp Reserve, we are delighted that Council have heeded the recommendation in the new arborist's report to protect these two important trees.

The trees are either the actual trees shown in photographs taken in the Camp in 1861, or regrowth from them.

The recommendation is outlined in **Shape Mount Alexander**'s *Camp Reserve Update* of 7 February in the following excerpt:

Preliminarily investigations into trees on the southwest side of Camp Reserve recommends Council restricting access around the bases of the two red river gums and laying mulch at the base of the trees. Temporary fencing will be installed around these trees. In addition, recent tree assessments for other areas of the reserve include recommendations to improve tree growing conditions and restrict car parking under the oak trees inside the reserve fencing along Gingell Street. Contractors will lay mulch under these trees and visitors to the reserve will be asked not to park under the trees to protect their health.

Contractors will be on-site over the coming week to undertake these works, which are anticipated to be completed within one week (weather permitting).

CASSOC notes that the 2020 Master Plan for Camp Reserve included the recommendation that "... the two Eucalyptus Camaldulensis [sic.] trees continue to be monitored, managed and protected for as long as practicable."
